
All of M. A. C. Will Soon Be Located at the Airport

"Assistant Secretary of the Navy John L. Sullivan gave the House Naval Affairs Committee today the names of six aircraft factories over which he Navy desires to keep "partial control" in connection with the Navy's post-war plans.

While he did not explain how this would be done, he said the Navy would like "to keep a string" on the following plants to meet the possibilty of future need: Curtiss-Wright Corporation, Columbus, Ohio; Douglas Aircraft Company, El Segundo, Cal.; Grumman Aircraft Engineering Corp., Bethpage, N. Y.; The Glenn L. Martin Company, Middle River, Md.; McDonnell Aricraft Corporation, St. Louis, Mo.; The Ryan Aeronautical Co., San Diego, Cal."
